

CHAMPIONSHIP QUIZ GAME

Description:

The winners of the 5 separate categories of quiz games will compete in a championship game. It should be done in school.

Recommended Grades:

- 2-5

Materials/Resources:

- Set of 3 Championship Quiz Game Handouts
- Pencils
- Champion's Certificate

Objectives:

Students will:

- Take turns selecting categories and points;
- Answer questions about Animals, Biographies, Health, Science, Social Studies; and
- Add whole numbers using the tens place.



Classroom Use:

The format differs from the other quiz games. Here, the 5 past quiz winners will participate, and the rest of the class will serve as the audience. Please caution the audience not to give any answers unless asked by the teacher. Note the game can be shortened by eliminating the last one or two rows of questions.

Teacher Directions:

Explain that each participant should write down their answers on the Points handout in the correct box for the category and points (e.g., Health for 20):

1. Pass out the Championship Quiz Game Points handout.
2. Explain that questions will be in 5 categories (Animals, Biographies, Health, Science, Social Studies). None of the questions will be repeated from earlier quiz games.
3. Locate the questions and answers sheets to use to run the game.
4. Start the game with a participant chosen at random. This student picks the category and points (e.g., Health for 20).
5. Locate the question on the Championship Quiz Game Questions handout. Read the question out loud. Ask them to think about their answers. Wait 15 seconds and read it out loud again.
6. Announce students will have 1 minute to write the answer in the right box (e.g., Health for 20) on the Points handout. At the end of 1 minute, ask them to put their pencils down.
7. Ask a student in the audience to give an answer. Determine if it's correct. If not, give the correct answer. Then, check to see which participants had it, and record it.
8. Ask students to put an X through the box on the Points sheet (i.e., the box for Health and 20).

9. Repeat the process and rotate among the participants to ensure everyone gets a chance to select a category and points.
10. Keep playing until all questions in the 5 categories have been attempted.
11. Ask students to total up the number of points they earned. Verify the totals from your own tally.
12. Announce and record the winner of the championship quiz game. Ask everyone to clap for this participant. Make a certificate and present it. Take pictures of the winner and the group.
